


Israelite army position

Position army



In Hebrew, there are two primary words that are translated as valley in English. One is the Hebrew word emeq (also spelled emek). This word is used in reference to valleys that are relatively broad or wide. A second Hebrew word for valley is gai, which implies a *narrow* valley. Whereas 1 Samuel 17:2 uses emeg to define this regional valley (also in 17:19), 17:3 uses *gai* to describe the specific location of the battle. The text says that the Israelites positioned themselves "on one side of the gai, with the Philistines on the other side" of the gai. Looking at the topography of the Elah Valley today, there seems to be only one place where the valley becomes literally *narrow* (just as the Hebrew word *gai* implies). It's location is to the east around a bend in the broader valley of Elah.


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Hereditary Gigantism-the biblical giant Goliath and his brothers


The biblical giant Goliath has an identifiable family tree suggestive of autosomal dominant inheritance. We suggest that he had a hereditary pituitary disorder possibly due to the AIP gene, causing early onset and familial acromegaly or gigantism. We comment on the evidence within the scriptures for his other relatives including a relative with six digits and speculate on possible causes of the six digits. Recognition of a hereditary pituitary disorder in the biblical Goliath and his family sheds additional information on his and other family members' battles with David and his relatives.








*The Jews were organized into groups of 1000 and each had a leader. Jesse was part of such a group, but too old to go to war










* David is estimated to be 15-16 years old

* "So all the numbered men of the sons of Israel by their fathers' households, from twenty years old and upward, whoever was able to go out to war in Israel" Numbers 1:45




Are you ready for your assignment?


- It was too big and heavy

- Saul was jealous of David's faith and courage; when David saw that, he quickly removed the armor (Source: Vayikra Rabbah 26:10)







Why 5 smooth stones?

- God did not tell David how many stones to bring
- David was preparing for other Philistines to attack him
- Goliath had four brothers. Their names, according to Rav Hisda, were Saph, Madon, Goliath, and Ishbi in Nob (see 2 Samuel 21:15–21). [Source: Sotah 42a, 42b]
- David was marching forward to avenge the honor of <u>five</u>... God, whose name Goliath was profaning; Aaron, whose descendants Hophni and Phinehas were murdered by Goliath; and the 3 patriarchs (Abraham, Isaac, Jacob), whose offspring Goliath was humiliating [Source: Midrash Shmuel 21]











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The age of Goliath is not clear, but early onset of pituitary tumours is typical of hereditary gigantism and limitation of lateral vision is common. Goliath himself had a shield bearer precede him, possibly to indicate to Goliath the direction of the approaching foe.

Goliath was killed by David who threw a stone at his forehead (1 Samuel 17:49). This gives further evidence that he suffered from pituitary gland dysfunction; a pituitary tumour pressing on his optic chiasm, and consequent visual disturbance due to pressure on his optic nerve, would have made it difficult for him to see the stone in his lateral vision. Pituitary giants look impressive in terms of stature, but may not have speed and agility to match their perceived strength. David, having agility, particularly having declined the heavy set of armour that was offered to him, and being skilled at sling shots, may have found a way around the fearsome looking giant by firing a sling shot from the side of the battlefield.

Lessons of David vs. Goliath

- Sometimes the opportunity to do the right thing is placed upon you when you least expect it (1 Samuel 17:22-24)
- Fear is paralyzing
- Fear is contagious but so is Faith
- How will you react when fear comes and faith is required? (1 Samuel 17:24)
- God uses my past to prepare me for the future (1 Samuel 17:34-37)
- God's past faithfulness should encourage me in the midst of the present fight (1 Samuel 17:37)
- Don't use earthly methods to fight spiritual battles (David refusing Saul's armor, see 1 Samuel 17:38-39)
- Don't run from the battle, run to God (1 Samuel 17:48)



- **Deuteronomy 31:6** "Be strong and **courageous**, do not be afraid or tremble at them, for the Lord your God is the one who goes with you. He will not fail you or forsake you."
- Joshua 1:7 "Only be strong and very courageous; be careful to do according to all the law which Moses My servant commanded you; do not turn from it to the right or to the left, so that you may have success wherever you go.
- Joshua 1:9 "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous! Do not tremble or be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."
- 2 Samuel 10:12 "Be strong, and let us show ourselves courageous for the sake of our people and for the cities of our God; and may the Lord do what is good in His sight."
